Pastor's Piece

Dear Folks,

I have received several questions about whether or not we have been instructed to take Holy Communion in the hand rather than receive on the tongue because of the coronavirus. The current Church legislation on this comes from the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments in a document named Redemptionis Sacramentum issued March 25, 2004. There it states plainly "each of the faithful always has the right to receive Holy Communion on the tongue." In terms of preventing the spread of disease, I offer the following thoughts. The mouth is not necessarily a worse cause of contamination than the hand. The food we eat is cooked so as to kill disease. We have health inspectors to examine restaurants and at home, we wash our dishes and clean the countertops to try to prevent diseases from getting into our food. I will spare you a gross list of the things that we touch with our hands on a daily basis but there is definitely a long list of possible contagions and that is why we are encouraged to wash our hands regularly with soap and water and not to touch our faces to prevent getting sick. It would seem that both tongue and hand can be a source of contamination. As a skilled distributor of Holy Communion, it is very rare that I touch a person's tongue when they receive the Host. With the same frequency, if not more often, do I touch a person's hand when they take Holy Communion in the hand. I would suggest that receiving on the tongue is actually less likely to spread disease than taking in the hand as the tongue method means only I am touching the Host with two fingers whereas taking on the hand means the Host is also touching the communicant's hand and fingers as well. Just things to ponder. I will always respect the rights of the faithful to receive as Church law allows. May the Lord protect us from all illness and disease!
